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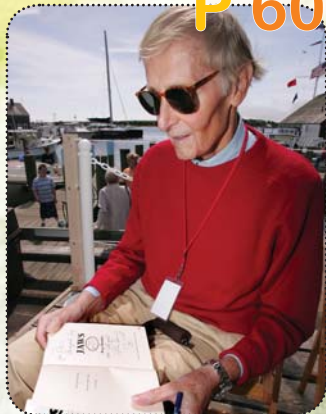

For centuries the sea has played a big part in the lives of Emiratis, and even today it provides an important source of food.

Fishing is both a job and a hobby. In the past, pearl diving was also important in many coastal towns and villages, but that has now died out.

Here is a conversation between a customer and a fisherman.

Customer: Good evening.

Fisherman: Hi and good evening.

Customer: Your fish looks very fresh.

Fisherman: Yes, we returned from our fishing trip a short time ago.

Customer: Can I ask you some questions about your job?

Fisherman: Of course, no problem, go ahead.

Customer: Thanks. How often do you go fishing?

Fisherman: We go everyday but if the sea is rough then we can't fish. We fish in the mornings and sometimes again in the afternoons.

Customer: What are the best months for fishing?

Fisherman: We fish all year round but the winter months are best because the weather is cooler.

Customer: How many fishermen go in the boat?

Fisherman: Between two to four.

Customer: What kinds of fish do you catch?

Fisherman: It's always a surprise! We use a net so we never know what's in the net until we bring it onto the boat. The most common types of fish are *hammour*, *shaari*, *tuna* and *sardines*. We put each type of fish into a different basket.

Customer: Do you earn a lot of money?

Fisherman: That's a secret! But the more fish we catch, the more money we earn. Our ancestors used to dive for pearls and there's always a chance that when you open an oyster you will find a pearl and become rich!

Customer: Thank you for your time. I think fishing is a difficult and dangerous job.

Fisherman: It is but we enjoy it.

Customer: I hope to see you again. Goodbye.

Fisherman: Don't forget to buy some fish before you go! Bye.

Can a name change affect the marketing of a product?



The **kiwifruit**, known as **kiwi** in many parts of the world, was originally called the *Chinese gooseberry*.

Kiwis are oval and about the size of a large hen's egg. It has a fibrous, brown skin and bright green flesh with rows of small, black, edible seeds. The fruit has a soft texture and a unique flavour. It is a commercial crop in several countries, mainly in New Zealand, Brazil, Chile and Italy.

The fruit was renamed by New Zealand exporters for marketing reasons in the 1950s. This name "kiwifruit" comes from the kiwi - a brown flightless bird and New Zealand's national symbol, and also a colloquial name for the New Zealand people.

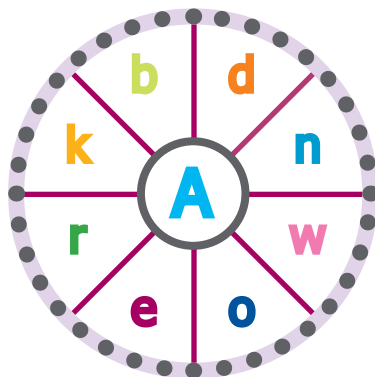

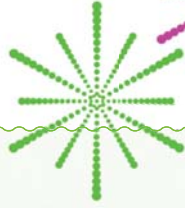

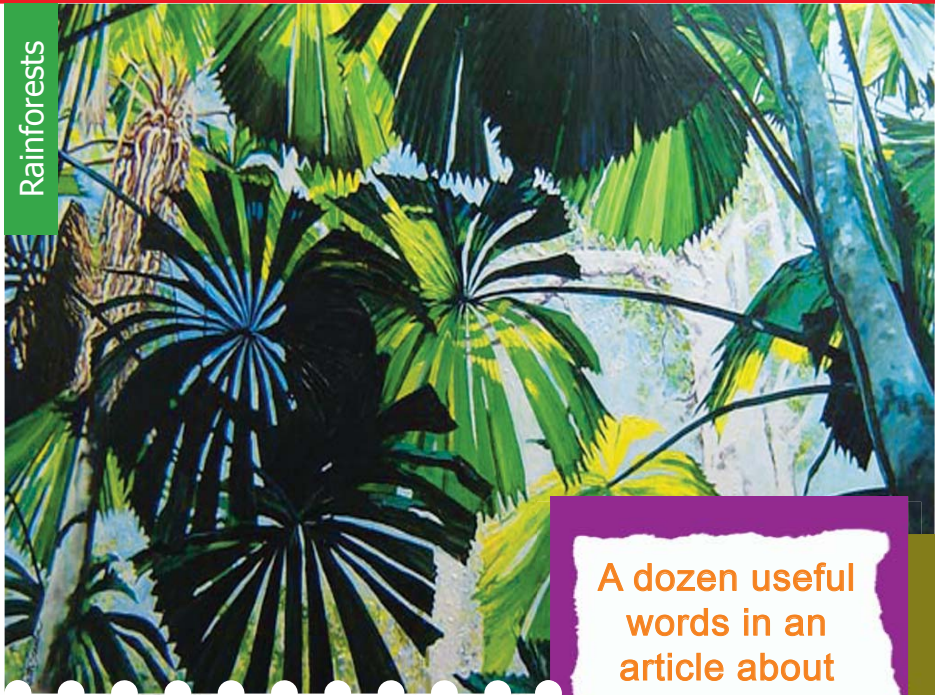

The *tropical rainforest* is a forest occurring in tropical areas of heavy ¹ rainfall . They are located around the ² _____ where temperatures stay near to 27° C degrees all year round, and there is high humidity. Rainforests receive 400-1000 cm of rain each year. The largest rainforests are in Brazil (South America), Zaire (Africa) and Indonesia (South East Asia).

The rainforests contain many ³ _____ of wildlife and vegetation. Although they cover less than 2% of the Earth's surface, they are home to 40-75% of all life forms on our planet. Rainforests are the most productive and most complex ⁴ _____ on Earth.

A tropical rainforest is typically divided into four main⁵ _____, each with different plants and animals adapted for life in that particular area. These layers are emergent, canopy, lower canopy and forest floor.

The *emergent layer* contains a small number of very large⁶ _____ which can reach heights of 45-60 m. Eagles, butterflies, bats, and some monkeys inhabit this layer.

Below the emergent layer is the *canopy* layer. This contains the majority of the largest trees, typically 30-45 m tall. The densest areas of⁷ _____ are found here. The fauna is more diverse and a quarter of all insect species are believed to exist in the rainforest canopy.

The *under canopy* layer lies between the canopy and the forest floor. This is home to a number of birds, snakes, and lizards, as well as⁸ _____ such as jaguars and leopards. Insect life is also abundant.

The *forest floor*, the bottom-most layer, is dark and damp and receives a tiny amount of sunlight. Only plants adapted to low light can grow in this region. Many forms of⁹ _____ grow here which help decay the animal and plant waste.

Tropical rainforests provide timber but¹⁰ _____ (cutting down trees) is a major problem caused by humans. Another factor causing the loss of the rainforests is expanding urban areas.

Rainforests have value as¹¹ _____ destinations and for the ecosystem services they provide. If development in the rainforest is¹² _____ then these special forests will continue to flourish for the benefit of all mankind.

What do you know about mangroves?

In parts of Abu Dhabi and along the coast you can see mangroves. These are trees that grow in hot, inter-tidal areas. They have the unique ability to survive in salt water, which would mean death for other trees.

In order to survive in salty water, the roots lift the plant out of the salty water and various clever methods are used to either filter out or exclude the salt. These aerial roots above water, allow them to breathe.

The UAE's variety of mangrove is called *Avicennia marina*, also known as the grey or black mangrove. Over the past year or so, more than 750,000 mangrove saplings have been planted in coastal areas and on Jubail and Saadiyat islands.

Mangrove forests are among nature's most biologically productive habitats. They are attractive to birds, fish and invertebrates such as shrimp. These forests help to stabilise and protect the coastline.

Diving with sharks



Tom, from Ask Tom, did a cage dive in South Africa last year. Here's his story.

First I'd read the book, and **later** saw the film Jaws and always wanted to see some real great white sharks. The opportunity to see sharks in their natural habitat arose during a holiday in South Africa.

The trip began in Gansbaai, a small town 160 kilometres east of Cape Town. It's a well-known cage diving destination.

We met at the cage dive operator's crew house. There were about 20 other eager divers. **Following** a safety briefing, including all the do's (take photos, ask questions...) and don'ts (throw things into the water, jump overboard...) we set off.

We quickly reached our destination about 10 kilometres offshore. **Then** the captain anchored the boat. **After that** the crew began throwing some 'chum' into the water. This is a mixture of minced tuna and sardines and attracts the sharks.

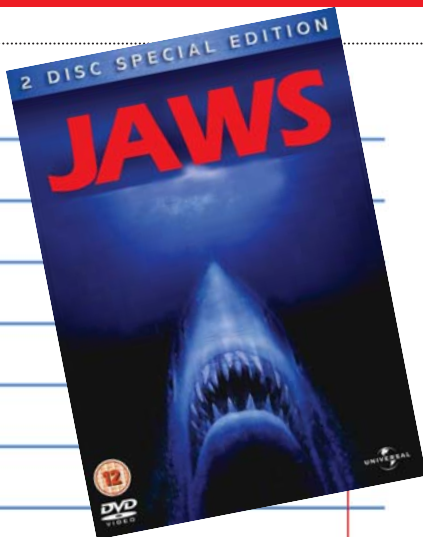
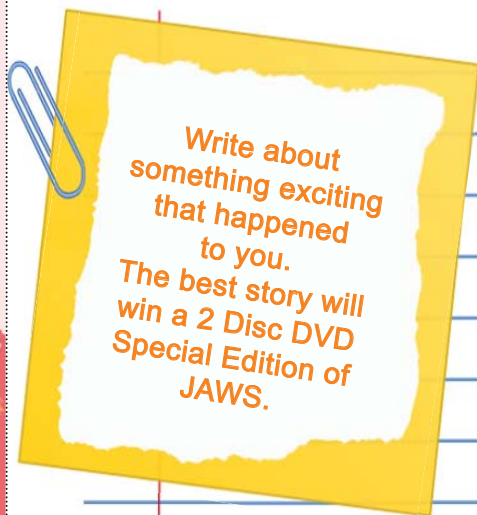
The water is cold so you must wear a wet suit which covers the whole body and keeps you warm. You also wear a face mask. The cage is attached to the boat at all times, with at least 60 centimetres above the water. It holds up to six people. You stand in the cage with your head above the water and when the sharks are swimming near the cage you put your head under the water to get great views. The sharks range in length from 2 to 5 metres.

Of course, sharks are wild and there is no guarantee that you will see any. I was lucky and saw about 10 at close-up range. Nearby there is Dyer Island, home to 50,000 seals, and a major attraction for the sharks!

Finally, the trips last around 3 hours and costs Dhs700. I had a fantastic time and survived to tell the tale. For adventure seekers, it's a once in a lifetime experience.

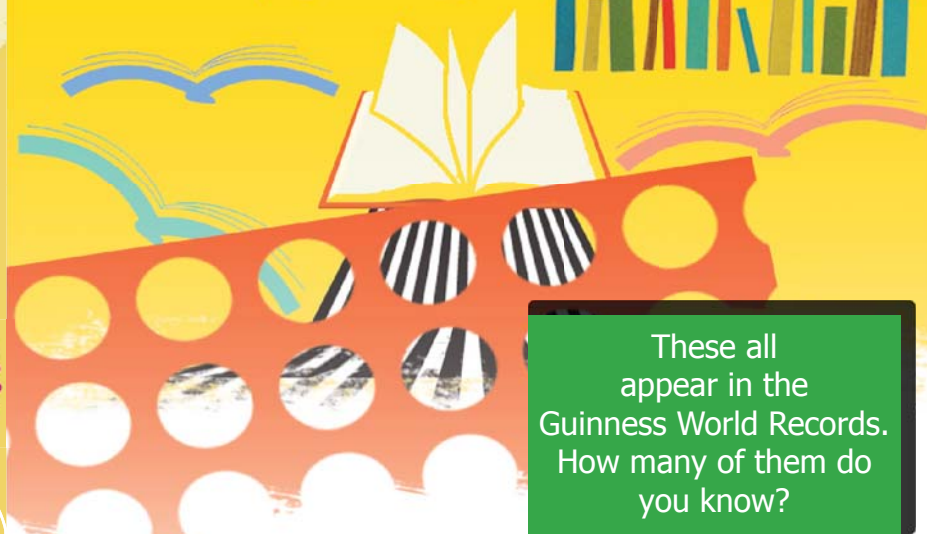

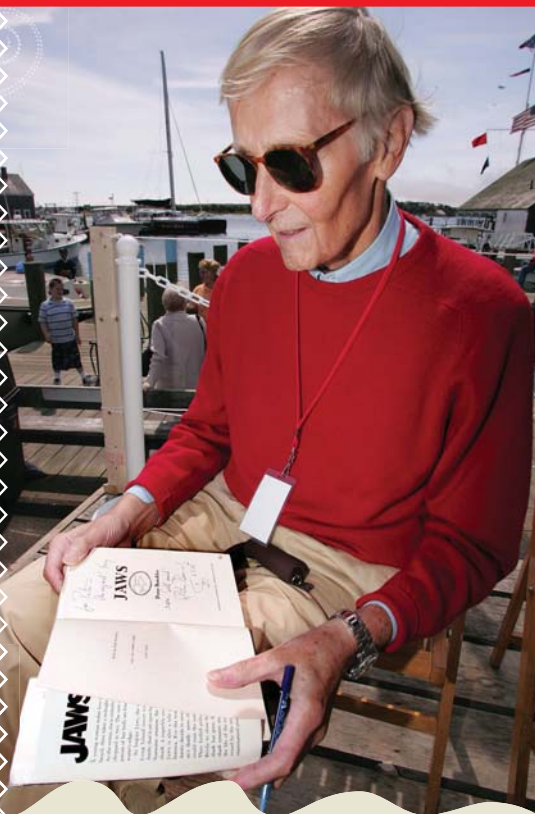

Peter Benchley

Peter Benchley (8 May, 1940 - 11 February, 2006) was an American author who is best known for his novel *Jaws*. It tells the story of a great white shark that preys upon a tourist resort, and the efforts of three men to kill it.

After leaving university he worked as a journalist and later as a speechwriter in the White House for President Lyndon Johnson.

Benchley developed the idea of a man-eating shark terrorising a community after reading of a fisherman catching a great white shark off the New York coast in 1964. He also drew on some material from shark attacks in the same area in 1916.

Jaws was published in 1974 and became a huge success. The film was released in 1975 and was directed by Steven Spielberg. It made over \$450 million.

He wrote numerous other books of fiction as well as some non-fiction works but nothing achieved the success of *Jaws*. The film is regarded as a watershed film in motion picture history, the father of the summer blockbuster film.

Benchley became very rich from book sales and film rights.

Jaws

Plot summary

The story is set in Amity, a quiet town near New York.

One night, a young woman called Chrissie Watkins goes for a swim and never returns. The next day police find her partial body on the beach.

Police chief Martin Brody knows it was a shark attack and wants to close the beaches, but is overruled by important people in Amity. They are afraid that if they close the beaches and announce a shark attack in the newspapers then summer tourism, on which the town's economy relies, will be damaged.

A few days later, the shark kills a young boy, an old man and a fisherman who was hunting it. Despite pressure to keep the beaches open, Brady closes them. An oceanographer, Matt Hooper, says that it is a Great White shark, a fish they call the 'man-eater'.

After a boy narrowly escapes being attacked by the shark close to the beach, Brody hires Quint, a professional shark hunter. The three of them, Brody, Quint, and Hooper set out on Quint's boat, the *Orca*, to track down and kill the shark.

During their first two days at sea they find nothing. On the third day, Hooper goes underwater in a shark proof cage to photograph the shark and attempt to shoot it with an underwater gun, or shark stick. However, the shark attacks the cage and kills him.

When Brody and Quint return the following day, the shark repeatedly rams into the boat, and Quint harpoons it three times. The shark leaps onto the boat and the boat starts to sink. Quint plunges another harpoon into it, but as it falls back into the water, his foot gets entangled in the ropes and he drowns. Now floating on a seat cushion, Brody spots the shark swimming towards him and closes his eyes, preparing for death. The shark gets to within a few metres of him, before succumbing to the wounds inflicted by Quint. Brody manages to get safely to shore.
