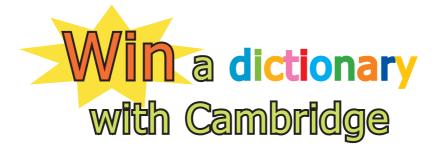
Cape Town

Some people love to talk in computer words. We call this 'computer jargon', which means words to do with computers. Knowing what these words mean can help you know more about computers. Some people use these words to impress other people.

A few years ago, I thought the words International Computer Driving Licence (ICDL) was a new way to get a driving licence until someone told me it was actually a computer qualification.

Working with young people and children has made me aware of what technology can do for us. It is now difficult to imagine a world without computers and the Internet. If technology is used in the right way, it offers great benefits for both the individual and for society.

Computer jargon buster

Here are some examples of computer jargon and their meanings in simple English.



Hard drive

the place inside your computer where you save documents, pictures and applications.

Junk email

direct marketing sent by email rather than by the post.

Domain name

the name used to identify a site on the Internet, such as english4u.ae

Font

set of letters, numbers and other symbols in a particular style. Some of the most frequently used fonts are Times New Roman and Arial.

FAQ

stands for 'frequently asked questions', this is a list of standard answers to questions which newcomers to a topic or website may have.

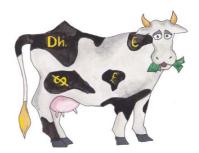

In the UAE, e-banking or Internet banking is widespread. Internet banking allows customers to conduct financial on a secure website operated by their bank. Customers can check the balance of their accounts and perform transactions such as money transfers and payment of bills.
Some customers worry about the aspects of e-banking. These people prefer to visit their bank to conduct business face-to-face with bank staff.
Most of the attacks on e-commerce and e-banking sites are based on deceiving the user to steal login data. One well known example for those attacks is 9
Phishing (pronounced fishing) is an attempt to obtain information such as usernames, passwords and credit card details by pretending to be a trustworthy company in an electronic communication. It directs users to enter details at a ¹⁰ website whose look and feel are almost identical to the legitimate one.
It is important that users never disclose their and other sensitive information to individuals and companies through the Internet.
E-commerce is an easy and convenient way to undertake business. In the UAE, it is certain to grow as more and more people use the Internet and companies, such as supermarkets, develop sites. This means that customers will be able to order groceries through the Internet and have them delivered to their door. We can avoid traffic jams and queues!



The Titanic was a passenger liner owned by the White Star Line and built at the Harland and Wolff shipyard in Belfast. At the time of her launching in 1912, she was the largest passenger steamship in the world. The Titanic was 269 metres long and 53 metres high and had a top speed of 23 knots.

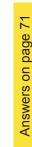
On the night of 14 April 1912, during her maiden voyage from Southampton to New York City, the Titanic hit an iceberg. The ship sank two hours and forty minutes later, early on 15 April 1912.

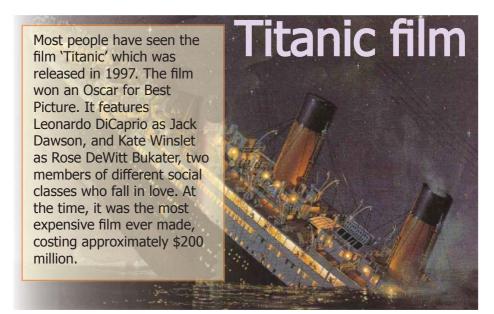
The sinking resulted in the deaths of 1,517 people, making it one of the deadliest peacetime maritime disasters in history. The high casualty rate was due in part to the fact that she did not carry enough lifeboats for all passengers and crew on board. There were 705 survivors.

The sinking of the Titanic, which had advanced technology and experienced crew, shocked many people. The interest in the Titanic continues to the present day.

Questions and answers about the sea

Here are two questions for you about the sea.

Why is seawater salty?

Rivers are the main sources for salt in the sea. When it rains on land, the water dissolves salts and minerals from soil and rock and this water flows into rivers. These rivers flow into the sea. Freshwater from the rivers evaporates* as the sun warms the sea and the salt stays behind.



* Evaporate is what happens when the sun heats up water in rivers or seas and turns it into vapour or steam.

Why don't ships sink?

Anything will float as long as its overall density* is less than the fluid that it is in. This means that even very large ships can float as long as they are less dense than water. To make sure this is the case. ships are designed so that they are not just solid lumps of metal, instead there are lots of empty spaces full of nothing but air inside a ship's hull.

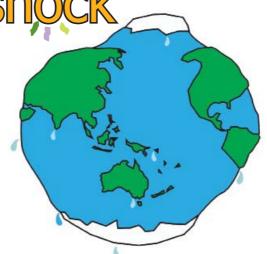


You can test this out for yourself with a lump of plasticine and a bowl of water. Roll the plasticine into a ball and see if it will float. Now make the plasticine into a boat shape - it should float even though it is the same amount of plasticine.

Intro to literature - William Wordsworth

For many people, reading is a great pastime. However, in our busy lives, we don't always find enough time to read, and books that are considered classics in English literature are often neglected.





William Wordsworth

William Wordsworth was a major English poet who helped to launch the Romantic Age in English literature.

William Wordsworth was born on 7 April 1770 in Cockermouth in Cumberland - part of the scenic region in northwest England known as the 'Lake District'. He had three brothers and a sister, Dorothy, to whom he was very close all his life.

Wordsworth studied at local schools and then attended St John's College, Cambridge, from where he received his B.A. degree in 1791. Wordsworth made his debut as a writer in 1787 when he published a sonnet in *The European Magazine*.

Intro to literature - William Wordsworth

His work *Lyrical Ballads* was published in 1798. This masterwork was composed by Wordsworth and Samuel Taylor Coleridge. At about this time, Wordsworth started to write an autobiographical poem, completed in 1805, and published posthumously in 1850 under the title *The Prelude*.

In 1802 he married Mary Hutchinson and they had five children.

Wordsworth was England's Poet Laureate from 1843 until his death in 1850.

Dove Cottage was the home of Wordsworth from December 1799 until May 1808. The cottage is situated by Grasmere Lake and the magnificent setting gave Wordsworth the inspiration for many of his great poems.



Dove Cottage is now a museum, and about 70,000 people visit it each year. Many of the Wordsworth's portraits, items of furniture and possessions are displayed.

Wordsworth's most famous poem about daffodils was composed in 1804, two years after he saw the flowers while walking by a lake on a stormy day with Dorothy, his sister.

Wordsworth published his poem in 1807. He later altered it, and his second version, published in 1815, is the one widely known today.

Wordsworth's 'Daffodils' is one of the most famous and widely read poems in the English language. It describes the peaceful images of nature and is a typical poem of the Romantic Movement.

I WANDER'D lonely as a cloud
That floats on high o'er vales and hills,
When all at once I saw a crowd,
A host, of golden daffodils;
Beside the lake, beneath the trees,
Fluttering and dancing in the breeze.

Continuous as the stars that shine And twinkle on the Milky Way, They stretch'd in never-ending line, Along the margin of a bay; Ten thousand saw I at a glance, Tossing their heads in sprightly dance.

The waves beside them danced, but they Out-did the sparkling waves in glee, A poet could not but be gay, In such a jocund company; I gazed - and gazed - but little thought, What wealth the show to me had brought.

For oft, when on my couch I lie
In vacant or in pensive mood,
They flash upon that inward eye,
Which is the bliss of solitude;
And then my heart with pleasure fills,
And dances with the daffodils.

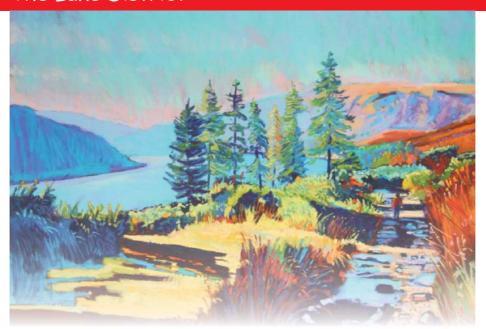

England

The Lake District, also known as The Lakes or Lakeland, is a rural area in northwest England. It is a popular holiday destination and is famous for its lakes and mountains. The area is associated with the early 19th century poetry and writings of William Wordsworth, see pages 56 - 59.

All the land in England higher than 900 metres lies within this area. Scafell Pike is the highest mountain in England. It has a height of 978 metres.

Meaning

If too many people work at a task, the end product might be ruined. It is often better for just one person, or a very small group of people, to undertake a complicated task.

Origin

The origin is uncertain but it first appeared in the sixteenth century. In its literal meaning the proverb refers to cookery. It means that when making broth, or soup, the recipe can be spoiled if there is more than one cook adding ingredients or seasoning into a soup. In such cases, it is better for one person to take charge.

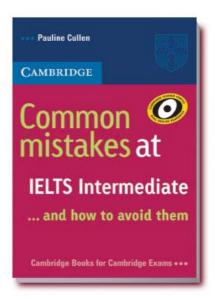
Examples

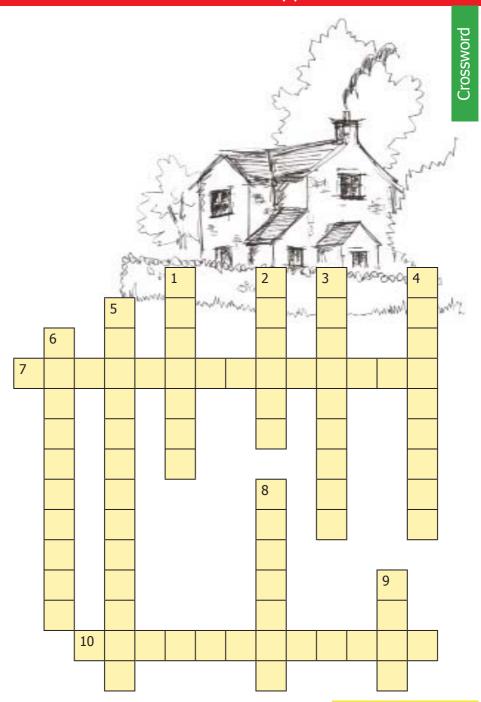

In the United Kingdom and the United States, as well as in some other countries, the 12-hour clock is often used. The suffix a.m. or p.m. is used after the time to make it clear which part of the day it refers to:

a.m. means before noon a.m. (at morning). In Latin it is ante meridiem (before noon) and can also be written as A.M. / am / AM

p.m. means after noon p.m. (past morning). In Latin it is post meridiem (after noon) and can also be written as P.M. / pm / PM

Examples

- 7 a.m. (seven o'clock in the morning)
- 2.30 p.m. (half past two in the afternoon)
- 11 p.m. (eleven o'clock at night)

What is noon and midnight?

 To avoid confusion, the correct designation for twelve o'clock is: 12 noon or 12 midnight.
